CHURCH BUILDING OPPORTUNITY Steven Tambuli, our CTC director in much of Malawi,

continues to share opportunities to help our CTC graduates with new buildings once they have pioneered a growing congregation.





Often CTC graduates go into unreached areas where people have never heard the gospel and pioneer new churches through evan-

gelism. Now we are seeing students who have not yet graduated but have learned enough to cause them to want to share

what they are learning.

This was the case with a recent student, Pastor Spencer Willo. He felt led to go into an unreached



Muslim area within the district of Balaka and almost immediately began to see tremendous results. Seven "staunch" Muslims came to faith in Christ and many others followed! These new believers are babes in Christ and some are afraid to make their new faith public in fear of persecution from the Muslim leader-

ship. We can help them make a difference by providing a suitable church building in which they can continue to grow and establish a testimony for faith in that area. Steven tells me they own the land where the building will sit. We need to raise **\$10,000.00** to provide **\$8000** for the building and an additional **\$2000** for my travel expenses to go to Malawi to dedicate the building. What a great Christmas present to the Lord Jesus, dedicating a building to the glory of God in the face of Islam! Jesus said that wherever He is lifted up, He will draw men and women to Himself. Let's raise up a building of light in a dark place where we can see the glory of God and the presence of the Holy Spirit making a difference! Please mark your gifts **"Pastor Willo".**

NEW CTC IN BOTSWANA, AFRICA

I'm writing part of this newsletter from a rather cold airport waiting area in London, England. I'm trying to make it to Johannesburg, South Africa, in time for my connecting flights to Francistown, Botswana. I never intended to be in London but things do not always go as planned. I arrived at my gate in Tampa only to find the flight to Atlanta delayed. The delay was longer than expected and Delta warned me I might not make my connection to Johannesburg. The warning was right! I was one of the first to deplane and ran carrying my two pieces of luggage as fast as I could to the airport tram system which began at gate A. After getting off at gate F, I ran up two long escalators to my gate only to find the plane at the gate with the door closed! I did not have any checked luggage and begged them to let me on the plane. I even went to the big window where I could see the pilots and waved my arms at them and they waved back but it didn't help! I was instructed to go to the Delta help desk and rebook my flight. That would most likely mean getting to Botswana a day later and missing the first day of CTC. I told the agents, who were very sympathetic and helpful, that I did not care how I got there but that I needed to be in Johannesburg by about noon on Sunday to make my connection to Botswana. After looking for at least an hour, they found a way to get me there on British Airlines through London. They walked me to the gate and the agent there printed my two tickets that would get me all the way to Johannesburg. After arriving in London in spite of another delay, I went directly to their help desk to get my seat assignment for the evening flight to Africa. I learned my ticket was

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"standby" and the plane was overbooked. They encouraged me to go to the Virgin Atlantic help desk, a partner of Delta, and ask them to book me on another flight. I got the last seat on a flight to Johannesburg, putting me there four hours prior to my Botswana flights. My down time in Heathrow was a solid eight hours before the twelve-hour flight to Africa. I have already spent 24 hours traveling to Africa with no sleep and still have about another 20 hours ahead of me. No doubt the enemy does not want me to make this trip. However, many are praying that God makes a way where there seems to be no way.

I was in Indiana attending a conference before leaving for this trip. While there, I was feeling very overwhelmed with all that is going on in my life right now: my brother Steven's situation and my mother of 97 needing much attention, the sale of our home and purchase of another that needs remodeling, packing for the move, trying to keep up with all the bookkeeping for the ministry, Daniel getting sick a day before I left, and this trip taking me away from being able to do anything about all that. One morning during the prayer time, the leader began to sing "Waymaker," a song I really needed to hear and sing. Feeling the weight of everything, I cried more than I sang. I needed to be reminded that He is my "WAYMAKER" and is faithful. Difficulties are something we are admonished to endure as a good soldier for Christ. It is one way that He molds more of His character into our lives. If you're feeling somewhat overwhelmed by life's situations, let me encourage you to go on YouTube and search for "Waymaker" by Leeland! Be reminded that God loves you and that He is working all things together for your good. He is your WAYMAKER, too!

NEW CTC BOTSWANA

I'm now on a farm in Botswana with George and Linda



Monkhouse. It is a large farm with a few farm hands to help George who is 78 and still very much on the go. Botswana is perhaps the flattest country I have ever seen, and the rainy season which be-

gins in October has not yet arrived. Everything, and I do mean everything, is sun bleached, bone dry. I have



passed several river and creek beds that do not have a drop of water. They tell me, however, that once the rain comes the country transforms and is lush and beautiful.

This new CTC program will be held in a classroom inside a small strip mall they own in Masunga village. At

the end of the mall is a church facility for a Pentecostal fellowship whose pastor is one of our students. George and Linda provide the church its space as an outreach ministry. We started with twelve stu-



dents sitting for the exam and expect the number to grow as word gets out. Botswana, as well as other African countries, is expecting to pass a law prohibiting an-



yone from pastoring without an accredited diploma. There are many churches started by men who simply want access to money. There is one questionable "pastor" even selling verification of your name in the Lamb's Book of Life for a \$5,000 donation.

Please consider helping with the new church in Malawi for Pastor Willo. Just put "Willo" on your check memo line. We continually ask God to bless you so we can continue to move forward.
